Another member who was missed was Barbara Leeb who injured her arm in mid-April. She is also wished a speedy recovery.



Vermicomposting

Instead of tossing your fruit and veggie scraps in the garbage can, you can compost them in a worm bin. Composting with worms is easy and fun! You can turn your table scraps into "gold" or worm castings, which is as premium a soil as you can purchase.

Red worms do not normally live in dirt, therefore you need to provide them with a shelter. You can buy or create your own worm shelter.

The MGs have worms for sale at \$1.00 a handful, samples of bins you can make or containers you can adapt.

Beginning May 4, compost tea will be **available** every Tuesday at 9:00 am by the green shed in the Discovery Gardens.

A couple of folks have been added to the CT team: Barbara and Gale Robinson have been working with the worms and making tea this spring, JoAnn Bohm has rejoined us on Tuesday to help with the downloading and selling.



Benefits and application of COMPOST TEA: (made from Worm Castings)

can be used as a soil drench or foliar spray

as a soil drench CT provides nutrients for the plant via the root system as well as enhancing the soil

- as a foliar spray CT provides microbial inoculants for both disease and insect suppression.

Price:

- **\$2.00 a gallon.** CT has been a consistent money maker for the MG's general fund, because **YOU** have been such great supporters of this project.

The tea is provided in gallon jugs and should be applied within 8 – 12 hours while the inoculants are still living.

DCMG GENERAL MEETING

April 29, 2010

The meeting was called to order by President **Judy Huntley** at 10:15 AM. Approximately 65 members were in attendance.

Agent Report: **Steve Renquist** said that Clifford Hein, DMD passed away. He was active in apple propagation. Pruning of fruit trees was done at his place for years by MGs. His memorial will be held at the Sutherlin Seventh-day Adventist church on April 30th at 1:00PM. **Steve Renquist** told us that people need to be reminded about DC-OSU Endowment so they can contribute. The balance of the endowment is about \$15,000. In the future proceeds from the endowment may be needed to provide positions at the OSU Extension. He announced a class on the Spotted Winged Drosophila on May 14th. at the Extension Annex at 1:00PM. The class will be lead by Amy Dreves, an OSU Crop Entomologist and Rick Hilton from SOREC. He asked that MGs sit near the back as the class is aimed at the crop producers. MGs may sign up in the office. There will be an online class lead by Gail Langolotto on May 11th. He said the Earth Day celebration booth was successful but only one of the new class was there. He reported that cuts be made at the State level, so the AG college at OSU has been asked to rework their budget. He thinks that all of the DC agents are safe from the cuts.

Officer Reports

Membership: **Mik Carlson** said corrections to the roster were emailed and an up to date roster is always in the Plant Clinic. There are 288 members. There are extra rosters in the Plant Clinic and on the table along with the OMGA MG cards.

OMGA Representative. There was no OMGA report.

Treasurer: **Karolyn Riecks** reported that the Overall Total funds are \$10,046.58. The April Income and Expenses were reported. The Pre-Sale made \$912.05. She will send in OMGA dues April 1st.

Vice President: **Liz Zamba** thanked **Joe Yetter** for his presentation on "Micology for Gardeners". The May presentation will be given by **Steve Renquist** on "Crop Forcasting".

President: **Judy Huntley** talked about the recent Plant Sale ads in the NewsReview. She discussed and passed around petitions from Sherrie Seng concerning the possible cuts in funds to OSU.

Committee Reports

Community Outreach: **Leo Grass** talked about a recent article in the NewsReview about the Detention Center's greenhouse program. He said he gave a "Basic Gardening" presentation to the Boys and Girls Club. There were 40 First Graders.

Plant Clinic/Farmers' Markets: **Judy Mercer** reported that 17 of the new class have completed their Plant Clinic(PC) 2-days training. There are 16 who have not and will receive a call. There are new handouts from OSU and Davis on the Spotted Winged Drosophila (SWD). Some of the handouts are being misfiled. Please return the handouts to their original location in the PC file. When working in the PC we need to talk with callers/clients about the SWD and make sure they get handouts. She said all of the new class are "really good" in the PC. **John Punches** has obtained some new PC books on tree ID, etc, for the PC and Farmers' Market locations.

Discovery Garden: **Judy Huntley** said the regular Tuesday garden workdays will begin next Tuesday at 9:00 AM.

Plant Sale: **Richard Johnstone** reviewed the general plan for workers; times and locations for the Plant Sale. It was requested that some MGs stay and help load the tables, etc. today after the meeting. **Chuck Allieo** asked for a volunteer to place the signs from the freeway off-ramp to the Fairgrounds. **Steve Renquist** said he would do that.

Awards: **Betty Ison** had nothing to report.

Hallmark: **Linda Thames** announced the 50th wedding anniversary of **Ken Hays** and his wife. She also said **Debbie Haynes** had had a hip replacement. She was at the meeting. **Barbara Leeb** hurt her arm and hopes to be at the Plant Sale to work.

Victory Garden: **Elaine Moriarty** reported that work at the Victory Garden (VG) is idle until after the Plant Sale. There are veggies growing in the greenhouse to be planted. Beets, carrots and peas are planted.

Saturday Market: **Judy Huntley** said the market has been running for two weeks and needs worker signups.

Compost tea: **Barbara Robinson** said that tea has been made and poured on the Plant Sale plants. Tuesday compost tea may be purchased for \$2.00/gallon. Please reserve through **Shirley Purcell**. Tell her the amounts you want each week. They make 26 gallons per brewing and can make a second batch if needed, so make reservations.

Old Business

Plant Sale: **Judy Huntley** reminded everyone to help load after the meeting. She said an email from **Doug Holloway** was received to the effect that **Tasha King** at the greenhouse does not need plant pots right now. The pots may be taken to Heartwood or to recycling.

New Business

Mini-College: Mini College is in Corvallis at Oregon State University on July 28-31. The General Meeting for July is changed to July 22nd.

Fun Day Trip: **Caroline Link** is asking for suggestions so she can plan a fun trip after the Plant Sale.

Umpqua Valley Arts Assn. Photo Artists: **Larry Sutton** said the artists will be in the Discovery Garden. He has asked them for copies of their pictures for the DCMG display at Mini-College.

When you are working in the Clinic ask all clients, regardless of the question, if they have fruit crops. If they do be sure and tell them about our new fruit fly. Suggest that they stop by and pick up the handouts or offer to mail them. We really need to stay on top of this.
