## YOUR PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Hope many of you can put July 22<sup>nd</sup> on your calendar to attend the next meeting at Yvonne Henderson's home.

One of the things to share with you this month is an email I received from our OMGA President Tamara Martin. At the June 5<sup>th</sup> OMGA Board Meeting a Long Range Strategic Planning Project was introduced. With all the changes that are going on at Oregon State University, it is felt that we need to be proactive. A committee, of at least five Master Gardeners and our Statewide OSU MG Program Coordinator, Gail Langellotto-Rhodaback, has been formed. Our own Jack Wright will be lending his expertise to this committee.

The overall plan is to first gather input from the OMGA membership. Then create a proposal for change that will be honed during the remainder of 2010. They wish to begin implementation in 2011. Their first organizational meeting was on June 21st. This is why I have felt the need to share this with the whole Douglas County membership and ask for your input.

OMGA has four main mission statements as part of the Oregon Master Gardener Program:

To enhance and supplement the Oregon State University Home Horticulture program.

To assume responsibility for performing special tasks

and engaging in continuous activities related to the program.

To promote a wide dissemination of information available as a result of university study and experimentation. Such information shall be in accordance with Oregon State University standards.

To work with other gardening organizations to enhance gardening in Oregon, when appropriate.

They are asking us to give feedback and comments on three questions.

1. What is OMGA doing at the present time to fulfill these mission statements?
2. What do you think OMGA should do differently in the future?
3. What barriers do you see that would need to be overcome to get us from where we are now to where we would like to be in the future?

## DCMG GENERAL MEETING

June 24, 2010

The meeting was called to order by President **Judy Huntley** at 10:20 AM at **Steve Renquist's** home/garden. Approximately 46 members were in attendance.

**Judy Hunley** introduced **Covie Quick** who was President of DCMG for four years starting in 1984.

**Agent Report:** **Steve Renquist** said he is sending forwarded emails to MGs containing diagnosis and pest websites. He thanked **Jack Wright** for leading the diagnosis class at his house. He said there have been a number of Spotted Winged Drosophila (SWD) captured in traps. He suggested that we, as backyard gardeners, set up traps and look at the drosophila under a magnifier to identify the SWD. SWD maggots are similar to the Cherry Fruit Fly maggots. He said if SWD are identified to spray spinosid on apples then blueberries, 7 days before harvesting. If present in blueberries there might be soft spots on the fruit or under a magnifier you might see the breathing tubes on the surface of the fruit.

### Officer Reports

**Membership:** **Mik Carlson** said there are 288 current members.

**OMGA Representative:** **Carolyn Register** asked everyone to think about possible \$25 raffle and door prizes for Mini College. They are tax deductible. She reported on the June quarterly meeting in The Dalles. It covered the new OMGA Logo; the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) concerning duties of the OMGA covering mini-college; the endowment fund; the budget acceptance; the new Strategic Planning Team and the appointment of **Jack Wright** to represent our chapter; and the support for the chapters by the OMGA.

**Treasurer:** **Karolyn Riecks** reported that the Overall Total funds are \$24,753.79.

**Vice President:** **Liz Zamba** thanked **Steve Renquist** for having the meeting at his home/garden. The July meeting will be at **Yvonne Henderson's**. The directions to her place will be in the Newsletter and emailed. A meeting place is still needed for August. **Susie Robbins** volunteered her place if no other is found. The summer meetings are potlucks so bring your chair, table setting and a potluck item. The meetings start at 10:00AM as there is no Continuing Education before the summer meetings. **Liz Zamba** requested help with the tables/chairs and audio equipment. Several people volunteered.

### Committee Reports

**Community Outreach:** **Leo Grass** said **Karolyn Riecks** did a fine job giving a presentation at the Oakland Second Sunday Presentation series. There was a discussion about the DC Fair in August and the need for booth themes. He said that the Extension units all will be located in the same area of the Exhibition Hall, but will be separate booths. He thought "Bugs in the Garden" would be a good theme. The signup sheet to work at the Fair will be in the Plant Clinic. The Fair is August 2-8 which includes a day before and after to set up and take down. The Extension main office will be closed during the Fair as the secretaries will be working at the Fair. There will be no Plant Clinic August 3-6.

**Plant Clinic:** **Judy Mercer** reported that the Plant Clinic is going well. She said the mentors have called the mentees to remind them to get their PC hours done and turn in their time sheets. More Alternates are needed. **Susie Robbins** said there have been 40+ contacts each week at the Farmers' Market. More veterans and trainees are needed to work at the Farmers' Market. **Carolyn Register** said Kruse Market needs MGs and Master Food Preservers and volunteers can be both MG and MFP.
