## April 28, 2011

**Policy for Payment of Receipts**  
**Toni Rudolph, Treasurer**

Our fiscal year runs from 01/01 - 12/31. To be reimbursed, all invoices must be submitted on an Expenditure Form, approved by the Committee Chairperson and in the hands of the Treasurer no later than 12/31 of the year the expense is incurred. Those invoices not turned in on time and requiring reimbursement, will need documentation which states why they could not be turned in as required. This documentation along with the signed Expenditure Form will be presented to the Executive Board. The Board will determine reimbursement. If reimbursed, the funds would come from the current year's budgeted amount.

**Spending Funds as Budgeted**

## Douglas County Extension Endowment Development

Grow it! Plant a tiny acorn, and grow a mighty oak! Read on....

### **Support the Douglas County Extension Endowment Development Fund.**

Master Gardeners know about growing things. We plant, we nurture and manage, and we harvest. Some things we grow for the short term: spring radishes, say; others take a little longer; some things we grow take a really, really long time to mature, but are worth it.

Think acorns and mighty oaks.

We plant oaks not for ourselves, but for generations we may never see.

We Master Gardener can have a mighty impact on the Extension Service's ability to work in Douglas County for generations to come. We know that demands on our Extension Agents will only increase over time, and their resources are already stretched thin. One way to relieve some of this pressure is to endow the positions and programs we value most.

Endowment is not a new idea. Universities rely on endowments for centuries. It's a way for people to support what is programs are most important to them. We have the option of putting our money to work right here in Douglas County at our Oregon State University Extension Service.

You've probably seen (and I hope you've responded to) the annual endowment development letters John Panches, our Extension Staff Chair, has mailed over the past two years, and you may have heard about donations made to the Douglas County Extension Endowment Development fund by Master Gardeners, Master Food Preservers, and lots of individuals. John tells me that over \$25,000 has been donated to date, and that he's getting ready to kick off an official

endowment very soon. This is a great start, but the real impact will come when caring individuals in our community decide to include our local Extension office in their estate plans. A major gift could endow our Horticulture faculty position, create new support positions, provide secure long-term funding for a special program – pretty much anything the person making the gift wants to ensure our Extension Office has the capacity to do. Gifts can be money, property, stocks, etc.; they can be given now or identified in a will; or in some cases they can be placed in trust to provide income streams to both the donor and Extension.

If you're interested and would like more information, talk to John (he's the one who taught our Master Gardener Botany classes recently). He can help you identify options and put you in touch with the various non-profit foundations that handle these matters for OSU and its Extension Service.

Remember, the choice to give is entirely up to you, but your generosity will have a huge positive impact on what the Extension Service can do here in Douglas County!

Plant an acorn. Grow a might oak. Future generations will thank you.
