

Credit for these beautiful pictures goes out to Maureen Benice. Thanks for the input!



Douglas County Wins Big!

At the Friday night Awards Banquet at Mini-College Douglas County made a sweep of the two big State Awards. Our own **Larry Sutton** was named **2012 State Master Gardener of the Year**, and **Leo Grass** was named **2012 State “Behind the Scenes” Master Gardener of the Year**. Both of these guys are more than deserving of the awards they have received, not only are they great ambassadors for Master Gardeners, but also the Extension Service as a whole being involved with other Extension programs like 4-H. Below are abbreviated



lists of the programs and projects both have been involved with----all of this information and much, much more was included in the nomination letters I wrote on their behalf to OMGA.

2012 State Master Gardener of the Year---Larry Sutton

Larry has been a MG for 8 years and has put in over 5100 hours of volunteer service. Larry has worked in some capacity with just about every program or project Master Gardeners has to offer. I call it the “Master Gardener Experience” (try it all to see where your niche is). For Larry the niche seems to be everywhere and everything.

Larry supports our outreach mission of Education by working in the Plant Clinic, Kruse Farms, and Farmer’s Market. He improves his skills by attending the monthly advanced diagnostic program. He’s worked information booths at Earth Day, Arbor Day, the Home Show, and the County Fair. He was a member of the PowerPoint Project, and has taught classes for continuing education and our annual Spring Into Gardening Seminar. He has done outside speaking engagements as part of the Speaker’s Bureau, and led numerous groups on tours through the Discovery Garden. Larry has also been a member of the Insect Committee, the Soil Testing Committee, and became a Certified Pruning Instructor.

Larry has helped with planning of the Winter MG Classes. He has been a mentor, and for several years took over as Mentor Coordinator and revamped the program to make it more successful. He helps set up our Audio/Visual Equipment not only for classes, but for continuing education, seminars, and meetings as well. Larry is in his second year as a member of the five person “Teaching Core”.

Larry can be found working on numerous projects at the Discovery Garden and Horticultural Learning Center. It may be helping build a deer fence, walking behind a mower, helping with greenhouse repairs, or cleaning the bathrooms. One year he was stand in Discovery Garden Work Party Coordinator. Larry has also helped Steve Renquist with his Biochar trials in the Victory Garden.

Larry has helped with fundraising projects also that include the Japanese Maple Tree Sale, Bake Sales, and Trash to Treasure Sales. He has also worked the Plant Sale, taking on the Security Coordinator’s job for two years. (Continued on next page.)

Larry has served as a member of the Audit Committee, Awards Committee, Nominating Committee, and Online Newsletter Transition Committee. He was chairman of a newly established Douglas County Endowment Committee, and most recently has been our Chapter President.

On the State level, Larry has been a State Representative, an Alternate State Rep., OMGA Historian, and 3rd Vice President. He has taught many classes at the leadership forum at Mini-College. He was Mini-College Photographer for a year, and recently was Chairperson for Mini-College Chapter Displays.

Larry is in his second year as a volunteer for the Oregon "Ask an Expert" program.

Larry is a vital supporter of the Extension Program as a whole not just Master Gardeners. Larry was Vice-President of the Committee working on Ballot Measure 10-86---Friends of Extension PAC. He attended many meetings, rallies, and activities expressing the value that Extension/Master Gardeners/4-H have on the Community, the ballot measure passed resoundingly to create a new tax base to fund County Extension.

Larry has been one of the most enthusiastic, energetic, and supportive volunteers Douglas County has ever had. He was Outstanding New MG Trainee in 2005, won the Horticultural Agent's Award in 2006, and was recognized once again in 2009 as DCMG of the Year.

2012 State "Behind the Scenes" Master Gardener of the Year---Leo Grass

Leo has been a MG for 11 years and has put in over 2200 hours of volunteer service. Leo is energetic, enthusiastic, and has a great attitude. Leo fully admits he is not a gardener, but his report with people makes him an exceptional volunteer at promoting the MG Program, and working with and educating the public.

Leo's activities have been wide and varied with in our program. To support our outreach mission Leo works in the Plant Clinic at least one day a week. He's part of the five person "Teaching Core". He improves his skills by attending the monthly advanced diagnostics program. He has been involved with Earth Day, the Fair Booth (2 yrs as coordinator), the Home Show (3 yrs coor.), and the PowerPoint Project. Leo is the current pH and Soil Testing Coordinator and has been doing so for 7 years, putting the program together from scratch. He has done numerous speaking engagements through the Speaker's Bureau, and taught 3 years at the Spring Into Gardening Seminar. He has lead both the Rosewood Homes and Princeton Street low income gardening projects. And as if Leo wasn't already doing more than his share at promoting our outreach programs, he took over as Community Outreach Coordinator 4 years ago. Leo stepped up to the plate and hit the ball out of the park so to speak. Our outreach program is more popular than ever and now Leo is doing even more engagements when he can't find someone else to fit the needed requests.

Leo has helped with the Winter Program, not only teaching lecture portions of the class, but also concurrent sessions on using the Library in the Plant Clinic. He has assisted with some program planning, and has also been a class mentor. (Continued on p7)

Leo has been Chapter 1st Vice President in charge of Continuing Education. He has worked on the newsletter production crew folding, tabbing, labeling, and banding the newsletter for mailing, and is currently the sole member of that crew now that the majority of members receive their newsletter online. He has been Plant Clinic Librarian, a Summer Meeting Host, and served as Nominating Committee Chairman. He also helps set-up the Audio/Visual Equipment for classes and meeting. Leo is currently coordinating the Saving Grace Animal Shelter landscaping project.

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Leo has helped at the Horticultural Learning Center and Discovery Garden. He has done several brick walkway or patio projects that have been open to the public. (Continued on next page.)

Leo has helped with fundraising also; working on the Plant Sale (last 3 years as Reference Table Coor.), Trash to Treasure Sales, Bake Sales, Japanese Maple Tree Sale, Fall Tree Sale, and organizing a used book and magazine sale. He also helped with the Auction, having a band he plays with come to entertain during the silent auction portion of the event.

Leo is a very hardworking and dedicated volunteer, and we are lucky to have him. Leo never seeks acknowledgement or praise, but is always the first to give someone else a pat on the back for a job well done. We know Leo is special and he was awarded the Outstanding New MG Trainee Award in 2002. In 2005, he was given the Horticultural Agent's Award, and in 2006 we once again acknowledged him with the Douglas County "Behind the Scenes" Award.

Betty Ison: 1591 NW Keasey, Roseburg

At the YMCA turn at the light onto Harvey Ave., then take an immediate right on to Keasey or from Stewart Parkway turn onto Valley View Dr. (by Staples), then turn left onto Keasey. (cream colored house, chainlink fence, diagonally across from Colony Market)

[Lots of annuals and perennials, and a little of everything else]

As a NoteThere is **NO** longer any on street parking on Keasey---they replaced parking with bike lanes. I recommend parking on Calkins or Moritz streets. I will not be responsible for any tickets written if you park in the bike lane (trust me they do write tickets). You can also park on Rachel---see next garden below. Tricia and I are within walking distance of each other.

Follow Directions to Betty's (see above). From Harvey Ave directions, turn left onto Rachel just before getting to Betty's house. From Valley View directions, just past Betty's and turn right on Rachel. Second house on the right. [Beautiful perennial beds]

Jackie Carpenter: 204 Martha Drive, Winchester (note: 9 am-4 pm only)**

From NE Stephens (old Hwy 99) turn onto Strauss Ave. and go up the hill to the second Martha Dr. (Martha is a loop) it turns left, the house is 5th on the left. From there to Steve's go back to Strauss Ave. and take a left, it becomes Josephine then right on Thora and he's the first house on the right. From Steve's house to Jackie's go left on Josephine, keep to the right you'll be on Strauss Ave., the second street on the left will be Martha. Steve and Jackie are within walking distance of each other.

[My garden is made up of raised beds and pots as I am a plant collector. Several trees in my yard have been grown from seed that I've collected, and many of my plants are cloned from cuttings from friends. It's a work in progress. I have several compost bins and compost has done wonders for my less than perfect soil.]

When coming to Winchester from Roseburg take Old Hwy 99 and continue past Costco until you see Totem Market. Turn right on Page Rd. Go past Winchester Elementary School and look for Thora Circle Drive, turn right. Continue straight on Thora Circle to the second left, veer left, 331 is first house on the right. Coming from the north of Winchester take Del Rio Rd exit to Old Hwy 99. Turn right and take old 99 south across the bridge to Page Rd and turn left, follow above directions from Page Rd.
