OSUEA Cooperator Award Winner

Congratulations to Shirley Purcell on being chosen for the OSU Extension Service Cooperator Award. This award is sponsored by the Oregon State University Extension Association (OSUEA). The award honors individuals and businesses who have made significant contributions to Extension programming in Oregon.



Extension cooperators include 4-H Leaders, Master Gardeners, Master Food Preservers, farmers and ranchers engaged in agricultural research, Master Woodland Managers and many other individuals, organizations and businesses who work in collaboration with Extension professionals to benefit all Oregonians.

Shirley was nominated by Sara Runkel, Nellie Oehler, and me for her outstanding effort helping deliver OSU Extension programming in Douglas County for 19 years. Shirley was selected as the award winner statewide in the category for individuals with 10 years or more service. Shirley will receive her award in early December at our annual gathering of Extension agents in Corvallis, from our OSU Vice-Provost Scott Reed.

The cooperator award evaluation scorecard is shown below to give you an idea how nominees are evaluated and chosen. Shirley knocked it out of the park and had the highest score of all nominees.

Evaluation Criteria - OSUEA Cooperator Awards (In the category of Individuals with 10 years or more of service)	Points
Program involvement...with Extension volunteer programs, time contributions with significant impact and leadership. For business or organization's, actions beyond what is normally done to conduct the business or activity.	60
Support...for Extension such as advisory councils, committees, fundraising, financial contributions, political support, etc.	30
Community service...other than Extension	10
Total points	100

If you are new to the OSU Extension Master Gardener organization and don't know Shirley, what impressed the evaluation group was her volunteer effort as a Master Gardener, a Master Food Preserver, and as a volunteer in our community with the food pantry helping to coordinate food distribution and preparation. 
Trash to Treasure Sale

November 30, 2017**

Call-To-Order: President Chris Rusch called the meeting to order at 10:00 at the First United Methodist Church. Thirty-seven members attended.

Agenda: Approved as presented.

Minutes: The October Chapter Meeting minutes were approved as published online. The November Executive Board minutes were approved as published online.

Agent Report - Steve Renquist:

- It is time to complete the conditions of volunteer service forms. The forms must be filled out, signed and filed with OSU in January of each year. *Volunteers not returning the forms by 01/15/2018 will not be allowed to wear their badges or work at MG functions.* Steve had forms available at the chapter meeting. Forms are also available at the Extension Office.
- Steve encouraged everyone to sign up to help at the 2018 classes.
- In 2018, there will be a reduction in the number of OSU Extension regional managers. Steve encouraged our chapter to focus on our programs during the transition.
- Pruning dates have been set for 2018:

- Spring Into Gardening will be **Feb. 24** and the theme will be *Greatest Hits*. The classes will be favorites from the past 10 years.

- The remodel is ahead of schedule. The construction is scheduled to be completed by 12/14. We may be asked to help move back into the space. An email will be sent out if/when help is needed.
