It is one of the easiest and least expensive things you can do in the garden that provides a plethora of benefits. By simply adding a layer of mulch to your garden right now, you can moderate soil temperature, reduce water consumption, add nutrients to the soil, reduce erosion, encourage earthworm activity, reduce weeds, and improve the garden's appearance.

OMGA Quarterly Report

The 2nd quarter OMGA Leadership meeting was held on June 1st in our Discovery Garden. We had perfect weather and great attendance by the county representatives.

The focus of the meeting was how we get members, both established and new, to work in our demonstration gardens, how we interact with the public and how we



get financing for our projects. The format was a panel discussion which included members from Douglas County and

Jackson County. Ideas will be summarized and sent to the membership.

After the meeting, members toured the garden. Many positive comments and compliments were expressed.

After the tour, Steve Renquist presented information about tasting and evaluating wine. Almost everyone had a taste (or more) of the various types of Umpqua Valley wine. All the wine was donated by DCMG members and Steve.



On Saturday, June 2nd, our chapter hosted the OMGA Board of Directors meeting at the Sutherlin Community Center. It was a great venue – we had plenty of space in the meeting room, the kitchen and for parking.



We had plentiful, delicious food served under the direction of Denise Fennell and Sharon

Bordeaux. Beautiful flower arrangements for the table were made and donated by Betty Ison, using flowers from her garden.

We celebrated Gail Langellotto's (State OMGA Coordinator) newly-awarded full professorship at OSU. Everyone enjoyed the delicious, beautifully decorated cake we had made for the occasion.



The meeting updated the representatives on current and future projects. Gail is proposing a standardization of payback hours for new trainees. Sixty hours would be the maximum required. Some chapters currently require seventy hours payback.

Gail also reported that the annual required forms for OSU can now be completed online; new trainees will receive badges with the new OSU logo and current members do not have to get these new badges. The Sustainable Gardening manual is still being reviewed. There is still a workgroup looking at how to make MG classes more accessible and affordable. The next International Master Gardener Conference will be held July 17-21, 2019 in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

Sue Nesbitt, OMGA president, asked for volunteers to work on writing a mission statement for OMGA. She also asked for volunteers to work on revising the representatives' handbook and to look at making it online rather than a paper copy.



Sue also requested that all chapters give thought to sharing the responsibilities of planning and presenting the Growing Gardeners conferences (now G2, formerly Mini College) in the future. Her thoughts are that the chapters could be divided into regions and that the responsibilities could be rotated through the regions. Within the regions, one chapter may be arranging speakers, one could arrange the venue, another could arrange food, and another could arrange housing. With

this plan, no one chapter would be overburdened with planning and the G2 would move around the state.

This year's G2 will be held at Linfield College, McMinnville, July 12-14. Registration is open and is not restricted to MGs. The public is invited to attend. There will be publicity notices sent to the chapters so they can be published in local newspapers.

The 3rd quarter Leadership and Board of Directors meetings will be held in Benton County, September 14-15, 2018.

Volunteer Hours Reporting

Time reporting can be a real chore but it is an important part of being a Master Gardener. Our chapter is evaluated at the state level in part based on how many volunteer hours we report. So all of the hard work we volunteers do is important, but it only is noticed higher up if it shows up on our time sheets! The other reason to report your time is to qualify for updated swinger bars for your name badge.

One of the confusing things about time reporting for both our newly minted Master Gardeners and our veterans is how to categorize your time on the timesheet. On the back of the forms (available in the Plant Clinic) there are brief definitions of what you should be reporting in each of the categories. You can also find this information and more on our website in the Volunteer Time Reporting section of the Documents and Forms page. An overview of using the timesheet is posted here also. There are reports of your posted time on the website and in the Plant Clinic so you can verify what I have posted. Generally, the reports on the website are a little more current.

There are two places you can submit your completed time sheets – the Plant Clinic and the Westside Greenhouse. I usually will pick up time sheets shortly before the Chapter meeting each month and post and update the web report within a couple of days.

~ IMPORTANT NOTES ~

- Please put your name on your timesheet. There are currently two time sheets in the box at the clinic for

people who did not fill in their names! If you don't see your hours in the report, one of these time sheets might be yours!

- Please report in your time in hour or half-hour increments only.
- Make sure that you total your hours for each category as I will not post your time without totals.
- Do not put your total hours in the Recertification Continuing Education box at the bottom right on the form.
- If you are still not sure what category to enter your time under, you can ask a veteran, an officer, your mentor, or send an email to me (Vicki.McAlister@csulb.edu). One of us will be able to help you.
