I'd like to take this opportunity to recognize several volunteers who received very special honors during the evening,



congratulate these standouts if you have a chance to do so.

Vicki McAlister is the 2018 Douglas County Master Gardener of the Year. Vicki has been a volunteer for 7 years and has put in nearly 2400 hours of service. She has been involved in a number of activities within our organization, outreach activities include Plant Clinic, Soil Testing, Insect

Committee, Class Mentor, Spring into Gardening Seminar (6 yrs) and being a Winter Program Assistant for two years. Vicki is a regular on the Victory Garden Crew (7 yrs), and their right-hand irrigation person. She has supported our fundraising activities which include Trash to Treasure Sale (3 yrs), Bake Sale (5 yrs), and Plant Sale for 7 years, where she helps layout vendor spaces, and works in cashier/checking.

In other activities, Vicki has been Chapter Treasurer (2 yrs), Chapter Membership Director, and worked on the Audit Committee (4 yrs). 

Vice-President's Report Vicki Barrett



BAKE SALE WORKERS NEEDED!

Our annual bake sale is coming up later this month on November 17, 2018, 9am to 3pm, at Sherm's Thunderbird Market in Roseburg. We will be receiving baked goods the day before on November 16th, 1:00-4:00pm, at the Extension kitchen. If you cannot possibly bring your goodies on Friday, we will also accept them the day of the sale at Sherm's all morning from 7:45 am on.

We still need bakers, donations of ingredients from nonbakers, and people to work the sale.

If you are baking, thank you! Anything receiving rave reviews from family and friends would be perfect! Recipes you are trying for the first time may not be the best choice. Keep in mind we need homemade items. Please do not purchase ready-made items for resale at our venue.

Our customers love a good variety of pies, breads, muffins, cakes, candies, etc. Gluten-free and sugarfree are always requested. If you are baking pies, please bake in sturdy aluminum tins as you would get from Shari's or Kruse Farms. Items should be completely wrapped in units to be sold, i.e. four muffins in a package, a dozen cookies, etc. Presentation is very important. The more attractive the item, the better the chance of it selling. This can be as simple as a festive ribbon tied around a loaf of bread.

Upon delivery, come prepared to be able to check off the following ingredient label we provide which will be affixed to every item: Item_____ contains: __wheat, __eggs, __dairy, __peanuts, __tree nuts, __soy. Check-off labels with these sensitive ingredients listed are available in the Plant Clinic or you can call Janet Parkerson or Sharon Bordeaux to have them emailed.

If you are unable to bake, but would like to donate to those who are baking, we can use any type of berries, cherries, rhubarb, peaches, apples, plums, pecans, etc. as well as butter, Crisco, flour, etc.. Costco has many of these items, or maybe you have extra in your freezer not yet in the freezer-burned state. Gardening with Biochar After 5 Years Steve Renquist

While working in Brazil during the 1980's I often heard about "Terra Preta" (black earth) from local farmers who had worked or traveled in areas of the Amazon Basin. The farmers described areas within the forest where indigenous people grew their crops as unique black soils that stood out from the oxidized red thin soil more common in the Amazon rain forest. These black soils were unique because they could be farmed for decades or longer and retain their fertility.

When I asked the growers about why the black soils were able to be farmed for so many years the farmers weren't really sure. I never really got a good answer until a few decades later

researchers started to analyze the black soils more carefully. The black soils contained large amounts of charred blackened wood, not the ash of modern slash and burn agriculture.

The secret to the long-term fertility of the Terra Preta was in the process of how wood and other organic material was burned and incorporated into the soil. Charred wood that has been burned slowly at high temperatures, with a limited

supply or complete absence of oxygen, will retain a carbonized, fine-grained, highly porous biomass. The indigenous people discovered if they buried these carbonized logs or coals in their crop areas that the resulting soil would retain nutrients and moisture better and actually improve over time.

Modern research has discovered biochar is a very stable form of carbon that persists in soil while ash is not. After making char, breaking up the finished product into smaller particles increases the surface area improving nutrient and moisture retention in the soil. Charging or soaking the biochar with compost tea or other liquid nutrients before spreading on the soil has also been shown to enhance the nutrient-holding capacity of a soil and enhances the biological activity of a soil. The plant response to the biochar addition to soil is quickened with charged char. The positive impact of



biochar on a soil is enhanced if the biochar is incorporated into the soil after spreading. Biochar also improves the structure of clay soils.

I have now made annual biochar additions of about 5-10 pounds over my 20' X 20' vegetable garden for five years. Each year I expect that there is no way my soil or the growth of my garden can get any better, and then it does! All types of veggies seem to grow better. Cool season crops like broccoli, kale, and collards were so beautiful this year that collard leaves were easily a foot across and kale plants grew to 4-5 feet tall. Warm season crops like beets, beans, tomatoes, and herbs were amazing. My wife told me if I planted more than 3-4 tomato plants this year that she would stop processing any of them. Since I need her help at harvest and processing time, I did just that. We still had

> too many tomatoes. Later I snuck a few unusual tomato varieties into the garden that Bruce Gravens gave me and told her they were just for research. The biggest impact the biochar has made in my garden plot is the ability to retain moisture for the plants, even in a summer that had 90 degree temperatures for much of July and August like 2018. I still only used my soaker hoses twice a week for one hour each time.

This fall when I removed the plants from my vegetable garden during clean up, I was amazed at the huge root systems, and entwined in the roots were small fragments of biochar. After seeing what wonderful soil and great garden results come from using biochar and cover crops, I want to continue to encourage any or all Master Gardeners to dive in to the process. I know there are many different ways to create great garden soil - why not use them all? Combining the use of biochar, cover crops, and compost made with biochar and other recycled materials from your yard is a fabulous routine. This is a great time of year to make biochar, and to incorporate it into your compost pile where it will soak up compost leachate that charges it with added nutrients and microbial life. If you are a gardener who strives to one day have the perfect soil, this is the path to take. Great gardening!


