Agent's Welcome

Welcome to the 2021 class of Master Gardeners™. This year Oregon State University and the Douglas County Master Gardener Association have an opportunity to welcome a new group of gardeners from around Douglas County for our first fall program. Our fall program, like the previous winter trainings, has three major components, classroom education, hands-on education and outreach to the community.

The classroom education comes when you enter the fall training class. Experienced instructors will share their gardening knowledge with you for eight weeks. Then when you begin your volunteer time in the plant clinic you will be able to work alongside veteran Master Gardeners solving problems for others in Douglas County. This time in the clinic will be where you really reinforce all that you learn in the classroom.

The hands-on education segment of our program begins during the fall training classes. Many of our lectures are supported by demonstration and lab work. We have a session planned for the greenhouses at our Horticultural Learning Center (HLC) in October. This class will teach you how to do vegetative propagation and seeding. We also have a session planned on Xeriscaping, the use of drought hardy plants, and a session on composting.

Our fall program begins on September 28th at the OSU Extension office, but we want to invite you on Thursday, September 30th to join us at 10:00 AM at our monthly meeting of veteran Master Gardeners at the Discovery Garden. We would like to invite you new class members to the garden to introduce our site and to join us for lunch. The Discovery Garden is a teaching and demonstration garden for the public located at the HLC. You will be impressed with all the interesting theme gardens you can learn from and help develop. We encourage the class of 2021 to join a hands-on volunteer project too at the Discovery Garden, greenhouses, or in the Victory Garden. The Victory Garden is a project at the HLC which produces vegetables for donation to UCAN.



The final component of our program is what we call our outreach to the community. This portion of the program consists of taking our sustainable gardening message to other groups in Douglas County. We give presentations and demonstrations wherever we can. Maybe you know a few groups we could reach. We also have a Master Gardener booth at the County Fair, and other gatherings around the county that you will be recruited to join. This is a great way to tell our story to others and recruit new trainees.

I am really looking forward to our fall class together. We will have a small group of about 20 people signed up to join us. When you come into our classroom you will be assigned a table and a mentor. Make sure that you ask your mentor to introduce you to all that our program has to offer, including a day-long seminar called "Spring into Gardening", organizational committees, and Mini-College which is a statewide gathering of Master Gardeners.

We challenge you to study hard, and to have fun learning. You will be representing Oregon State University when you volunteer as a Master Gardener™ so we ask you to accept our gardening ideas and philosophy of sustainability when you reach out to the public. You will soon see that the energy and enthusiasm of our veteran Master Gardeners is infectious and we look forward to you joining our organization.

The Prez Sez Julie Stanbery

Welcome to our new Master Gardener trainees. For the first time in 37 years, we are holding a fall training class. This is an interesting challenge for our chapter, but these last 2 years have taught us how to rise to the occasion!

Training sessions will help build your knowledge of plant science and home horticulture. You will receive a lot of information in classes and in practical workshops. Veteran mentors will be working with you to guide and support you throughout your first year as a Master Gardener. We challenge you to be openminded and prepared to learn.



Following your November 16th final examination and graduation, there will be one general membership meeting (November 18) before we take a 6 week hiatus during the holiday season. However, we will start the new year with a bang! We are planning a New Years party to welcome back all of our veteran volunteers and have the opportunity to spend an afternoon getting to know our newly graduated volunteers.

As Master Gardeners our primary objectives are to assist the horticulture agent in answering home gardening questions and to disseminate university research-based horticulture information. All of our educational outreach programs are based on the sustainable gardening techniques you learn in class. Beginning in January, you will have one year to complete your 60 hours of volunteer service. The most important task is helping staff our Plant Clinic where you and your mentor will be answering questions for the general public. You will learn to use our excellent library and computer programs.

Weather permitting, we will also be working weekly at the Discovery Garden and in the greenhouses. In this issue of the Newsletter, you will read about our organization and the many diversified opportunities available to complete your payback hours. In the coming months we will talk in more detail about how you can choose the areas in which you wish to volunteer. Our **chapter Newsletter** is the primary source of information and updates about coming events. Peruse it monthly - it's worth the read!

Our facility at River Forks Park is called the Horticultural Learning Center (HLC). It includes our 5 greenhouses, the Victory Garden and the Discovery Garden. You will be attending practical sessions at the HLC Thursdays in October.

Our September membership meeting is **Thursday, September 30, at the Discovery Garden pavilion**. As part of your training experience, you will be asked to come to the garden at 9am on the 30th for your first introduction to the garden. The garden heads will meet with you to give you an overview of the activities in our educational garden. You are then invited to attend your first general membership meeting. Following the meeting, you will be our guests for potluck lunch.

We look forward to sharing our gardening knowledge with you so you can in turn share your knowledge with others in Douglas County. See you in the garden!

As Douglas County's Oregon Master Gardener Association (OMGA) representative and an alternate representative, we meet quarterly with other representatives from Master Gardener Chapters across the state and the OMGA Executive Board. We help to develop goals and objectives and make decisions that will set OMGA policies. We share what Douglas County Master Gardeners are doing with the rest of the state and learn about projects other chapters are participating in at their local area. As representatives, we also provide information to our local chapter about OMGA news and events.

OMGA and its county chapters were created in 1983 to support and supplement OSU's Master Gardener Program. OMGA is tax-exempt and serves to unify and support chapter programs and horticultural education. When one completes the Master Gardener Program, membership in OMGA is automatic the first year. After that, membership requires annual dues.

Services provided by OMGA include:

- Educational outreach via Mini-College.

- The quarterly-published newsletter "The Gardener's Pen."
- The PNW Handbooks, given annually to be used in the Plant Clinic.
- Scholarships to an OSU horticultural student and to help send attendees to Mini-College.
- Grants to assist chapters fund special programs.
- Search for Excellence Award, which recognizes outstanding projects by chapters that can be adapted by other chapters. Douglas County won this prestigious award in 2012.
- Select and honor the Oregon Master Gardener of the Year.
- Select and honor "Behind the Scenes" Master Gardener of the Year.

Hello everyone. It had been a dream of mine to become a Master Gardener for many years and my dream came true in 2015. I made it my mission to give it all that I could. To learn, volunteer and give an extra hand to help our Douglas County Master Gardeners program.



Every time there was an event going on where I could get my payback hours, I went. It was always rewarding to get the opportunity to learn something new. One of the biggest events that I volunteered for was, Trash to Treasures. If you like yard sales, then this is the event for you. We hold one of the biggest one-day yard sales in Douglas County.

I've been the chair person in charge of Trash to Treasures for four years. We hold the sale in Winston at the Winston Community Center.

Master Gardeners can drop off donations at my house, the Discovery Garden, or I sometimes pick them up at their home. Once I receive the donation, I price it and box it up and store in my utility trailer. Some of the items that can fetch a higher price, I will sell early to get the best price for that item. When my trailer is full, we have a wonderful Master Gardener who for the last few years has allowed us to store items in her shed. This year it was filled completely full.

I tell all New Master Gardeners that this event is a great way for you to get your pay back hours in fast and you can work both days - Friday setup and Saturday sale - as many hours as you want. It's always fun and one of the best things is that if you volunteer to help then you get to shop early at the sale before the customers.

This is a list of the general items that we take for donations: all household items, kitchen, crafts, sporting goods, tools/hardware, books, collectibles, toys, games, puzzles, plumbing, electrical, pet items, photo frames, office/business supplies, linens, purses, gardening, furniture (clean), jewelry, electronics, glassware, home decorations, camping.

What we do not take: baby items, beds and mattresses, exercise equipment, food, old TV sets, clothes, wine glasses, holiday items, VHS movies.

We have decided that a summer sale is better for Trash to Treasures so we will be having our event one month after our Plant Expo that takes place in May. So, set your calendar for the first weekend in June 2022. I'll be in touch with everyone about volunteering and donating.

Plant Sale

It is the first Saturday in May at the Douglas County Fairgrounds. We turn the 4-H building into a Plant Expo, including dozens of local vendors who join us.

We bring thousands - and I mean thousands - of plants from our greenhouses to the Fairgrounds for a one day sale. This is the largest fundraiser of the year. This fundraiser along with the Trash to Treasures Sale in March and the Bake Sale in the fall provides the funds to pay for all the wonderful things the Master Gardeners do for the community.

We start working on the next year's sale the week after the Plant Sale to take inventory and see what we need for a successful sale the following year. The greenhouses work year around to get ready for this huge event. After you have your classes in seeding and propagation, you are very welcome to give us a hand working in the greenhouses. It is also a great way to work off some of the payback hours. We set up

everything at the Fairgrounds the day before the sale and then watch the magic happen as people line up Saturday morning before the doors open to get the best plants. When the doors do open, there is a constant flow of people coming to see what we have that they can't live without. By the end of the Plant Sale day, the inventory is greatly diminished. The success of this sale is all due to the hard work of everyone. I hope we can count on you to help out this year.

Discovery Garden

Welcome to the Discovery Garden at the Horticultural Learning Center! As new Master Gardeners you are invited to join us in a great adventure as we continue to develop our year round educational garden and teaching facility. MG volunteers participate in all areas of garden management including landscape design, planting, pruning

and the ubiquitous weeding.

Working in the garden is a stimulating hands-on experience and lots of fun. All trainees will be asked to schedule volunteer payback time in the garden. These sessions will help familiarize you with all aspects of the garden and give you the opportunity to decide which area of the garden you would like to offer your volunteer time during the year.

Established in 1999, the entire garden has been built by thousands of Master Gardener volunteer hours and community groups such as Job Corp and inmate work crews. We have 20 plus gardens within the DG including Japanese, children's, hedgerow, orchard, scented entry, lilies and dahlias, shade and sun, compost, hummingbird, ornamental shrubs and grasses, butterfly, herb, xeriscape, rock and easy access areas. Items of particular interest include the spider gate, human sundial, and the moon gate. We also have added numerous benches and picnic tables.

The goals and directions of the garden come from MG volunteers with guidance from OSU Extension and our Home Horticultural Agent, Steve Renquist. We use the children's garden, worm bins, compost bins and pavilion

as an outdoor classroom for school children and youth groups. Other gardens are used for public demonstrations including pruning and plant care.

Your fall training program classes contain information in many aspects of the garden such as waterwise gardens, dry garden (xeriscape), water collection and irrigation techniques, container and adaptive raised beds (easy access), herbs, Japanese, perennials, annuals, roses, lilies, and much more! All of our classes include ecological management practices that stress integrated methods (IPM) and low impact techniques.

My name is Julie Stanbery and as coordinator of the Discovery Garden, you will be hearing many garden updates from me. Your Thursday classes in October will take place in the Discovery Garden and in the greenhouses.

Your first experience in the Discovery garden will be combined with our chapter meeting on Thursday September 30th. Beginning at 9:00 am, you will be introduced to some of the veteran MG's who work in the individual gardens and learn the lay-out of the gardens. These classes are OUT-OF DOORS so dress for weather. We encourage everyone to participate in the garden training sessions.

Greetings to the Master Gardener Class of 2021. The Victory Garden has increasing success each year following its opening in 2009. Our main and demo gardens grew 7,267 pounds of vegetables in 2020 to be distributed to local pantries and community kitchens.

Amazon Smiles

Are you really donating to our organization in Roseburg?

As Treasurer this past year, I started to wonder why we weren't receiving more monies from Amazon. Granted, it takes quite a while to post to our account. They do not send a check, they deposit the monies into our bank account quarterly. However, as of today, it states that \$224.59 is all that we have received to date. The amount deposited into our account is only \$64 thus far. While I do use Amazon a lot, I'm a little puzzled to think that my donation alone has been nearly a quarter of the amount generated. I think there may be some misunderstandings on how this is done.

This is free money everyone! If you don't specify what organization you wish to donate to.....Amazon will choose for you....and you may not wish to have your donation to go to a non-profit that you normally wouldn't want to donate to!

Amazon will donate .5% of everything you purchase on Amazon to the charity of your choice. Several steps need to be taken.

1. Type in SmileAmazon in your URL.
2. Follow directions to sign up for the charity of your choice, and hopefully you may choose "Master Gardener Association", **located in Roseburg, OR.**
3. To keep AmazonSmile ON in the app, you must have the "Notifications" enabled in your settings. Otherwise, you'll need to type in SmileAmazon in your search bar each time.

(If you have signed up under ANY other Master Gardener Association or Oregon Master Gardeners, etc., your money is not coming to our chapter).

Ask the Tool Man Alley

Several weeks ago, I was at the Discovery Garden sharpening a number of our Discovery Garden shovels using one of my portable bench grinders. One of our members was intrigued with the way I had temporarily mounted the bench grinder

to the work bench. His comment was **“At home I have little work bench space. There is no reason why I couldn’t use this mounting idea at home while using my bench grinder.”**

It is quite common for many of us to have limited counter bench space in our garages or workshops. At the same time, we still like to have pieces of equipment readily available in our shops/garages to perform our routine tool maintenance tasks. I feel two of these essential pieces of equipment are a vise and a bench grinder. These devices are normally permanently mounted to the work bench top at opposite ends. I have four bench grinders, each having a different wire brush, polishing discs and different grit grinding wheel set-ups. I switch between grinders, depending on my maintenance task. I don’t want to constantly stop and individually change brushes and grinding wheels. This convenience required me to develop some type of temporary mounting solution.



My solution: Mount the bench grinder to two 11-inch x14-inch x 5/8-inch pieces of plywood glued together for strength. Securely hold the bench grinder and plywood base to the work bench top, using a heavy-duty welding clamp.

You can see the bench grinder on the right is permanently mounted to the workbench counter top. It is mounted to the bench top with two 1/2 inch bolts drilled through the counter top and secured with 2 black plastic wing nuts, in front and back of grinder, allowing me to remove the bench grinder and base from the bench top. The bolts are drilled through



the bench top and are inserted from under the countertop up through the grinder. While this solution allows me to remove the grinder from the work bench top, it is not as easily done as using the solution on the grinder secured only by the large sliver welding clamp.

Here is a photo of the bench grinder that is mounted only to plywood base and temporarily secured to the work bench top with the use of a Berger Welding clamp. This method allows me to quickly loosen the welding clamp and removing the base and grinder from the workbench top, freeing up the workbench counter space. I can then grab another bench grinder that is need to use for my next task and clamp it down. **No time-consuming changing of brush wheels or grinding wheels.** This grinder set-up is the last step in most maintenance tasks, it includes a wire brush and a polishing pad that shines up the tool you are working on, and the polish also provides a barrier on the tool to help reduce rust build-up. Please note this grinder does not have any factory guards covering the wire brush or polishing wheel. It is best not to remove guards on any bench grinder.



I recognize not everyone will want to purchase a bench grinder. However, this tool will significantly enhance your routine maintenance tasks. While a new grinder will cost between \$60 to \$100, if you go early to estate or garage sales you can sometimes find a used grinder for \$20 to \$40. The welding clamp I use can be found at most stores that carry welding supplies. I found mine at Harbor Freight tools for less than \$20. It is a Berger 12”x3/4” Welding Clamp.



Lastly, safety always comes first, so **DON’T FORGET TO WEAR YOUR gloves, safety glasses, ear protection, work apron and face mask.**

If you have only one or two tools you need sharpening, please feel free to contact me or catch me at the Discovery Garden during our regular Tuesday work days. Happy Gardening. Keep those garden tools clean, sharp and properly stored. Stay safe.

OFFICER REPORTS

Membership - Kay Livermore: We have 229 members. Kay has been researching the hours of members, following up on those who haven’t completed their 60 hours.

OMGA - Kish Doyle: Nothing to report. Next OMGA meeting is October 1 and 2.

Treasurer - Diane Smith-Lewsadder:

The audit for June 25, 2020 to June 18, 2021 was performed on June 18, 2021. We met with our current Treasurer, Diane Smith-Lewsadder, at the Discovery Garden Pavilion and with former Treasurer, Toni Rudolph. The audit committee members were Vicki McAlister, Dawnetta Loomis and Karolyn Riecks.

The following items were reviewed during the audit:

- Confirmed our chapter 2020 Tax Return was filed with the OMGA Treasurer.
- Verified that chapter liability insurance is being maintained for the members.
- Verified that the current budget was being used to monitor income and expenses.
- Reviewed random financial transactions for the audited period to verify that transactions were properly documented and accurate.
- Reviewed bank statements and reconciliation reports to ensure that our electronic records accurately reflect transactions in our bank accounts.
- Checked that financial documentation on the Treasurer's computer regarding financial statements, bank statements and reconciliation reports was up to date and complete.

Because of the pandemic, we verified information on the Treasurer's computer and not the computer in the Plant Clinic.
