## DCMG GENERAL MEETING

April 24, 2008

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by **President Elaine Moriarty**. Approximately 53 members were in attendance.

### Reports

**Treasurer:** **Elaine Moriarty** reported that the Account Balances as of 4/22/08 are \$54,576.85. One of our CDs will expire on 4/26/08 and **Elaine** asked the board if it would be okay to roll over the CD into our other CD which is due 5/26/08. The board members agreed with doing that.

**Vice President:** **Bill Howitt** thanked "Four Chairs Theatre" for their performance today. **Bill** does not have a May program yet. Contact him if you have any suggestions. **Merrill McFarland** will be hosting our June meeting, **Rusdee Chastain**, our July meeting and, tentatively, **Judy Danielson**, our August meeting. **Elaine Moriarty** advised members that the DCMG scrapbooks, kept by our historian, **Marjorie Orr**, are in the back hallway for members to view.

**State Representative Alternate:** **Barbara Mac Pherson** reported that Mini-College will be from July 23- July 26. Sign up by June 10<sup>th</sup> and you will get a 10% discount. She read a list of when other MG chapters were having plant sales. The new revision of the Sustainable Gardening book will be complete by the end of 2008. The Gardener's Pen should be mailed out soon.

**Membership:** **Diane Aiello** said that 49 people were dropped from the membership for non-payment. As of today there are 242 active members. **Diane** thanked **Elaine Moriarty** and **Shirley Purcell** for helping call all the unpaid members to remind them to pay dues. **Diane** said she is donating a new "Western Garden" book and a handmade apron for the Plant Expo raffle. **Bob Brindley** explained that raffle tickets will be sold at the door at the Plant Expo. It will be a "Chinese" raffle where you only buy tickets for the items you want to win. **Larry Jackson** said that the Wildlife Safari is donating one "lion feed" for the raffle.

**Plant Clinic:** **Carol Gray** circulated the calendar.

**Community Outreach:** **Elaine Moriarty** announced that **Jack Wright** is resigning as Outreach chair at the end of the summer. There will be an article in the newsletter asking for someone to take over for him. **Jack** read an article in a local flier that **Patti Langille** submitted about the Plant Expo. He was given a round of applause for his many years of service with Outreach.

**Discovery Garden:** **Elaine Moriarty** reported that most members were working in the greenhouse rather than the DG, preparing for the Plant Expo. She relayed a thank you, from **Julie Stanberry** to **Marjorie Orr** for donating all of the mint compost for the new garden that new class members are designing.

**Newsletter:** **Elaine Moriarty** said that articles for the next newsletter are due at midnight this Friday, April 25<sup>th</sup>.

**Publicity/Website:** **Elaine Moriarty** reported that **Patti Langille** has sent out lots of articles on the Plant Expo and has placed a large sign at Fred Meyers. **Patti** sent in the graduating class picture to Snapshots that should be published sometime. **Elaine** announced that there is a new Douglas County Master Gardener web address. **Hallmark:** **Elaine Moriarty** reported that long time member **Al Greer** died. His daughter asked that his name be listed on the MG memorial wall in the DG pavilion. **Marianne Major's** husband has been going through chemotherapy. **Lillian Lockwood** died from a fall. There will be a potluck memorial in her honor at the pavilion in the summer.

**Agent's Report:** Steve Renquist advised that a new quarterly Master Gardener magazine published by Washington State was available. He said that the kids' garden program will cover a couple of groups and will meet in the Discovery Garden. The first session will be April 30<sup>th</sup> from 1 – 3 p.m. Steve had asked for members to help him and he has 10 volunteers so far. The week after the Plant Expo, ballots should be arriving in voter mailboxes. He suggested discussing with the PAC anything that you can do to encourage people to vote.

### Old Business

**Proposed Bylaws Revision Vote:** Elaine Moriarty reported that the proposed bylaws changes were published in the newsletter and she asked for a motion to vote on the changes. Bill Howitt made a motion to accept the changes as published. Maureen Benice seconded. There were no questions or discussion. A vote was taken and the motion passed.

**Plant Expo Update:** Gloria Amorde said that everything was ready for today's pre-sale. The weather has not been cooperative, but the plants look good. She said that more help is needed for the Plant Expo. Chuck Aiello said that he needed volunteers to put out lawn signs in various communities. He said that some small ads have been in the paper this week and a large ad will be in the Sunday paper. Bob Brindley said that nearly all the vendor booths have sold out. He has five left and they may sell out. Comparing this year to last, there are more exhibitors and more booths. He thanked Caroline Link, Maggie Nichols and Leslie Farrell for calling vendors. Chuck reported that three 4H groups and one FBLA group will help at the sale.

**PAC Report:** Chuck Aiello said that the campaign has been going well. The PAC raised \$23,323 in donations and has spent \$10,617 so far. Ballots will be coming out May 2<sup>nd</sup> with Voters' Pamphlets coming out before. There will be five supporting statements in the pamphlet. There will be TV and radio advertising. There will be direct mailings to voters as well as door-to-door canvassing of neighborhoods. Door knob ads and bumper stickers will be given out. The 4H youth will be having a rally on Garden Valley a week before the election. There will be PAC table at the Farmer's Market. There have already been ads in the North County News, Umpqua Shoppers and the News Review.

### New Business

**Nominating Committee:** Elaine Moriarty advised, per the bylaws, she has appointed a nominating committee for the next election. Irene Thomason is chairing the committee. The other members are Anne Waddington and Barbara Mac Pherson. Anyone interested in being an officer should contact members of the committee.

**Art Festival Booth:** Elaine Moriarty said that there is a sign-up sheet in the MG office for the MG booth at the Art Festival. The booth will be set up at the Festival in lieu of the Farmer's Market. The dates for the festival are 6/27 – 6/29.

**Compost Tea:** Elaine Moriarty reported that Shirley Purcell will begin selling compost tea every Tuesday, starting on May 10<sup>th</sup>. The price is \$2/gallon. Call Shirley to reserve the tea.

**Plant Show and Tell:** Bud Cruger brought in a tulip and a narcissus from his yard to show members.

**Garden Symposium:** Larry Jackson of the Wildlife Safari is organizing a garden symposium on May 1<sup>st</sup> starting at 10 a.m. Garden clubs will be coming to explain who they are and what they do. He asked that some MGs come out and talk about MG.

**Junk Plant Material:** Larry Jackson said that the Wildlife Safari will take any plant material people are junking. His crews will come and dig it up for people. Call the Wildlife Safari if you are interested.

### *How many gardens are there and where are they located?*

There are 5 gardens; three are located in Tillamook and two in Bay City. Garden Tour Passports are needed for admission to the gardens. Instructions for obtaining Garden Tour Passports are below. You may start at any garden and visit as many of them as you wish. Please note that pets are not allowed in the gardens.

### *What type of gardens will I see?*

Gardens include a cottage style garden on the banks of the Trask River, country cutting garden in town, an established park-like landscape garden, a perennial garden accented with whimsical art and a hillside garden with views of Tillamook Bay.

### *When will the gardens be open?*

The gardens will be open from 11 AM until 5 PM.

### *How much does it cost to visit the gardens?*

Garden Tour Passports are \$15 per person for adults and children 12 and over. Children under 11 must be accompanied and supervised by an adult. You can pay by cash or checks made out to TCMGA.

Garden Tour Passports can be purchased in advance from:

OSU Extension Service in Tillamook, 2204 Fourth Street

TCMGA Saturday Farmer's Market Booth at Second and Laurel Ave. in downtown Tillamook, from 9 am to 2 pm.

Sending a check or money order (no cash nor credit cards) to "TCMGA", P O Box 712, Tillamook, OR 97141. ( If ordering by mail, include your name, mailing address, phone number, and if you will be picking up your ticket at the Museum the day of the tour or would like it mailed.) Mail orders must be received by June 15<sup>th</sup>.

Go to <http://extension.oregonstate.edu/tillamook>, and click on "Spade & Wade Garden Tour" for more information and a printable form to order passports.

Passports may also be purchased the day of the tour at the TCMGA booth outside the Tillamook County Pioneer Museum.

### *What else will there be to do besides seeing the beautiful gardens?*

New this year, eight plant vendors will sell plants at the Tillamook Pioneer Museum from 10 am to 3 pm and TCMGA will have garden art and cookbooks for sale. A food vendor will be present selling breakfast snacks, box lunches and beverages
