Agent's Report by Steve Renquist

Giving Good Advice to New Gardeners

Last month I talked about the huge number of new gardeners that are out there growing food for the first time. These rookie gardeners are tilling up plots that have probably not been prepared well and planting seeds or transplants without much knowledge. We are about 2-3 weeks into the new gardening season and the phones are already starting to ring with concerned callers on the other end. If you intend to help in the plant clinic this summer lets remember not to jump immediately to, what should I spray as a solution. Instead try to follow our plant disease and insect management handbook philosophy which is, describe the problem, look for symptoms and signs that will help you decide what the problem is, and then think about cultural practices that might help resolve issues before we spray.

When new gardeners come to us for advice, whether they are in the plant clinic, at the farmers market, or just talking with us in our neighborhoods be prepared to take some time with them. These people will often be looking for a gardening education and not just a solution to their dilemma. That is why I like to return to cultural practices as a way to resolve gardening problems. Think about all the steps listed below we take to create a good environment for our plants that eventually helps us succeed. New gardeners don't know this stuff.

1. Choosing a site, good sunlight, soil, drainage, no deer
2. Preparing our site, adding compost or manures, or making a lasagna garden
3. Planning our garden layout, keeping a record
4. Use our garden plans from previous years to plan a crop rotation
5. Knowing which plant varieties do well in our area
6. Knowing when to plant what veggies depending on soil and air temperature
7. Proper fertilization if soil tests find deficiencies, pH adjustment
8. Knowing when to water and how much, and when water causes disease
9. Mulches that help plants, mulches that harbor pests and tie up N
10. Knowing major pests of each veggie or fruit and when they appear
11. Knowing about cloth like row covers to prevent insect feeding
12. Growing plants vertically to reduce rots and be productive in a small space
13. Knowing how to attract pollinators and beneficial insects
14. Use companion plants that like each other for inter-planting. When one crop finishes the other fills out the space

When you share this type of information with new gardeners you will see their eyes light up. Most of us want to grow our veggies without pesticides and certainly on a small scale it can be done. As we help these new gardeners they will be bitten by the gardening bug and want to learn more. Don't forget to invite them to join us in the Master Gardener Program. Steve

The meeting was called to order at 10:04AM. by **President, Elaine Moriarty**. Approximately 48 members were in attendance.

Reports

Treasurer: Karolyn Riecks reported overall total balances as of 5/27/09 of \$37,164.14. The Plant sale figures: Income; Drawings 717.00, Entry Fees 1,890.45, Sales-event 20,650.00, Sales-pre 3,518.40, with a total Plant Sale income of 29,413.85. Total Plant Sale Expenses are 5,779.23 so far.

Vice President: Roger Sawyer reported that next month's meeting starts the Summer Meeting program and it will be held at **Judi Danielson's**. Information on how to get there will be in the Newsletter. **Elaine Moriarty** reminded everyone that our meetings are open to friends and family...just bring food.

State Representative: Carolyn Register said information on Mini-College is downloadable on the site mentioned in the latest email. That the Off-Campus price in the previous email was a typo and the cost is \$70, not \$470. Mini-College is August 5-8 and registration is to open June 1st. She requested silent auction items to take to Mini-College and received a few suggestions and pledges of two bonsai maple trees from Maplewood Trees and a stepping stone made at the class that **Judy Dake** and **Kathren McIntyre** are holding in June.

Membership: Mik Carlson said that there are 273 members.

Committee Reports

Plant Clinic/Farmers Markets: Judy Mercer reported that Veteran alternates are needed for Plant Clinic.

Community Outreach: Leo Grass said that **Philece Humphrey** and **Tasha King** grew marigolds and **Barbara Robinson** helped the kids at Fremont Jr. High plant them. He said he had an email sent around concerning a two-month, full time job at Phoenix School helping with their garden program.

Awards: Betty Ison said there were no awards.

Hallmark: Linda Thames reported that **Yvonne Henderson** fell and broke her wrist while helping the loading of plants at the greenhouse for the Plant Sale. She came to the Plant Sale the next day. **Susan Haacke** was in an accident and got whiplash and **Rex May** will receive and "Thinking of You" card.

Agent Report: Steve Renquist said he had some House/Garden pest booklets left. He gave an update on funding of the Extension Services. The County is good but has requested that the Extension pay for the utilities in this building, so be energy wise. At the State level the May budget estimate deficit is smaller than expected and that there was a constant growth of budget, not of revenues. There may be a restructuring where the Regional offices will have more specialty people and the County office have one generalist. More accurate financial information will come in July or August. He also said that he will open his gardens up for touring at the next General meeting since he lives within walking distance of **Judi Danielson's**.
