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## NOTES FROM THE CLINIC

—*Judy Mercer*

Things have been getting very interesting in the Plant Clinic this month. We've had some new insects that were a real challenge.

We received some digger wasps, which turn out to be a very beneficial. The adult eats sap, nectar and (wait for it) caterpillars. Their larva eats grubs. I hope they visit my garden.



We also received a large California prionus beetle (*Prionus californicus*). They are borer beetles. The major damage is done by the grubs, which eat the roots of a wide variety of trees and shrubs. The adult borer may be over 2 inches and the grub over 4 inches long. The adult is reddish brown to black. Pesticides are not effective but they may be controlled by parasitic wasps. They emerge from mid-summer to fall.

In the last couple of weeks we are receiving a lot of calls on the fall webworm. They seem to be out in force this year.

I want to thank all of the Clinic volunteers this month. You are doing a great job and we really appreciate it.

There are still a few slots open for this month so please call or stop by the Clinic and sign up.

Just a quick reminder; if you are unable to come in for your slot please call our alternates and try to get a replacement. Thank you.

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## DCMG GENERAL MEETING

August 25, 2011

The meeting was called to order at 10:14 a.m. by **President Judy Huntley**. Approximately 43 members were in attendance.

The meeting started with an introduction of visitors. **Shirley Purcell** introduced her two visitors, **Gwen Graham** from Washington State and **Jessica King**, **Gwen's** granddaughter.

### Officer Reports

**Membership:** **Barbara Robinson** handed out a revision to the membership list. With a couple of reinstatements, the membership now totals 288.

**OMGA Rep:** **Maureen Benice** said that members who have subscribed to the OMGA e-mail distribution list had received an e-mail notice survey about what they want to hear from OMGA. So far few members have responded. The survey only has five short questions. Please fill out

the survey. **Maureen** wrote an article for the OMGA newsletter.

**Treasurer: Toni Rudolph** reported that the total of all accounts is \$25,094.14. The reserve accounts for \$5,659.10 and the money market accounts for \$18,028.69. Instead of allocating interest earned between all of the accounts, interest is now in the money market account. **Toni** read the categories that made up the income and the expenses for the month. The 2012 Budget figures are due to her by September 26<sup>th</sup>. The executive board meeting about the budget will be on October 5<sup>th</sup> and the budget will be presented to the membership at the October general meeting. The board will be presenting a balanced budget to the membership. Be sure to give **Toni** a line item budget and be prepared to justify it to the board.

**Vice President: Leo Grass** is attending a wedding in California, so he could not be here. **Debbie Hesseltine** was also unable to be at the meeting today.

**President: Judy Huntley** thanked everyone for doing their jobs while she was president. She wished **Larry Sutton** good luck in his terms as president.

### Committee Reports

**Community Outreach: Maureen Benice** said that she will be giving a talk at the Conference for Extraordinary Living. **Toni Rudolph** will be giving a presentation for Medicare.

**Plant Clinic: Maureen Benice** said that there are a few blank slots on the September calendar, with September 1<sup>st</sup> being completely empty. The Farmer's Market is also completely empty on the Labor Day Holiday weekend. **Maureen** said that she needs one MG volunteer for Kruse Farms on September 24<sup>th</sup>. **Barbara Robinson** volunteered to work that day.

**Discovery Garden: Julie Stanbery** brought in a vase of tiger lilies that originally had been grown by **Emil Johnson**. She said that when it comes to the budget the Discovery Garden needs to tighten its belt. She is scheduling a DG garden meeting to discuss the budget for September 14<sup>th</sup>, immediately following the executive board meeting. The raised bed area looks great thanks to **Jamie Gentry, Jeannine O'Neil** and **Ann Sedlacek** who have taken over the area. The Children's Garden is looking great due to three new recruits, **Cindy Rich, Sharon Hopkins** and **Betty Bean**. The Japanese Garden is also looking good due to the work of **Marty Katz** and **Chris Rusch**. Those garden heads that have not submitted a description of their garden to **Marty** for the website, should bring that to the September 14<sup>th</sup> meeting. All the gardens in the DG look good with the exception of the shade garden. **Noel Groshong** will have the irrigation in the Japanese Garden done by December. The September General Meeting will be at the pavilion in the Discovery Garden.

**Awards: Betty Ison** has had no further updates in hours from **Pam Barrows**.

**Kruse Farms/Brosi: Maureen Benice** reported that everything is going well at Kruse Farms. Fort Umpqua Days will be in Elkton on Labor Day weekend. We usually have representatives that work that weekend. Saturday has enough volunteers, but she needs a volunteer for Sunday. **Merrill McFarland** volunteered to work that day. Everything is going well at Brosi Farm.

**Compost Tea: Shirley Purcell** said that everything has gone well this year. Next Tuesday will be the last day they will produce tea.

**Victory Garden: Mik Carlson** reported that everything is going great and that she has a great group of volunteers this year. She commented that they are growing "Fortex" beans this year and that they are large and good tasting. **Ruth Stafford** took Tuesday's produce to UCAN. There were 187 pounds from the Victory Garden and 15 pounds extra from MGs. The total donated to UCAN so far is 878 pounds. If any MGs have extra produce they have to donate, bring it to the garden on Tuesdays or give **Mik** a call and she will pick it up.

**Hallmark: Linda Thames** sent thank you cards to **Dottie Jordan** who donated manure for the Discovery Garden and **Fred Rhodes** who donated the use of his dump truck to transport the manure. **Linda** thanked **Barb** and **Gale Robinson** for picking up and delivering the manure. **Linda** sent a card to MG **Cindy Stevens**. She and her husband are owners of Gold Fantasy and are going out of business due to his poor health.

**Historian: Rosemary Brinkley** hosted the group at her house for this meeting. She described her yard and house for the group. She has volunteered to be our new historian. Get articles and pictures to her. She will be enlisting **Marge Orr's** help.

### Old Business

**Fair: Judy Huntley** thanked everyone that worked at the fair. We had 147 contacts and everyone liked the display. **Sharon Hopkins, Eileen Kelley** and **Karen Orr** created the display for Mini-College and **Leo Grass** was happy to use it for the fair.

### New Business

**Insurance: Judy Huntley** said that she, **Toni Rudolph, Larry Sutton** and **Debbie Hesseltine** have been working on the liability insurance. They are working on getting new bids as the insurance is costing us more. The insurance company had the number of members at a much lower amount than it actually is. So the premium increased to pay for the additional members.

**Awards Banquet: Judy Huntley** said that she is chairing the awards banquet committee. She has two

sign-up sheets, one sign-up for a head count of who will be coming and what food they will be bringing and a second sign-up for those members who are willing to volunteer to set-up before and clean-up afterwards.

**New Membership Fee:** **Judy Huntley** said that the bylaws require the executive board to determine membership fees annually. The board decided that members that get the newsletter online will be charged a fee of \$10/year. Those members that get a hard copy of the newsletter will be charged a fee of \$15/year. The additional \$5 will nearly cover the additional cost of postage.

**Mentor Sign-up:** **Maureen Benice** has a sign-up sheet for those members wanting to be mentors for the 2012 winter training class. She is going to try to get members of this year's class to be mentors. Members can sign-up to be substitutes if unable to mentor full-time. The orientation is November 15<sup>th</sup>. **Maureen** and **Debbie Haynes** will be in charge of winter training and mentors for 2012.

**Tomato Taste-Off:** **Bob Brindley** will be doing a tomato taste-off at the September general meeting.

**Compost Pile:** **Gale Robinson** said that he just turned the compost pile. Please don't scatter it. **Julie Stanbery** asked where the new set of chips behind the compost pile came from. No one knew.

**Installation of Officers:** **Jack Wright** administered the oath of office to the following new board members: **Larry Sutton** – President, **Barbara Robinson** - Vice President, **Toni Rudolph** – Treasurer, **Cindy Rich** - Membership Director and **Maureen Benice** – Alternate OMGA Representative. **Debbie Hesseltine** - Secretary and **Debbie Haynes** - OMGA Representative, will have the oath administered to them at a later date. Retiring or changing position officers, **Barbara Robinson**, **Leo Grass** and **Judy Huntley** were thanked and given gifts for their service on the board.
