The President's Post

Welcome to summer! Though we need rain, we are all hoping we don't see any further damaging thunderstorms. Now that wildfire season has started, we should all be aware that storms can be a source of fire and be adjusting our landscapes to protect our properties as much as we can.

My husband, Bill, a fellow MG, and I were fortunate to attend the recent International Master Gardener Conference (IMGC), held in King of Prussia, Pennsylvania. Approximately 1,100 were in attendance from the U.S., Canada, and South Korea. We had a great time visiting some of the many beautiful gardens that surround the area. We learned about turning a formal cultivated garden into an entire native plant garden. We heard about research being done on pollinators that visit varied cultivars of hydrangea, echinacea, and sedges. We saw the beauty of an extensive display garden.

A highlight of the conference was hearing Dr. David Gibby give his keynote address. Dr. Gibby is the founder of the Master Gardener program. He began the program in 1972 when he was the area extension agent for Washington's King and Pierce counties. He said he couldn't answer all the questions he was receiving from gardeners so he turned to established garden club members to volunteer their expertise. The goal was to educate all volunteers with the same research-based information and then address the needs of the public and backyard gardeners seeking advice. Now, 47 years later, there are approximately 95,000 Master Gardeners in all 50 states, Canada, and South Korea.

The next IMGC will be held in Norfolk, Virginia, in September 2021. The IMGC in 2023 will be held in Overland, Kansas.

Back home in Oregon, I'd like to thank Steve Renquist for sharing his beautiful garden with all of us at our first outdoor chapter meeting of the year. His gardens are as beautiful as could be. Though we had a little rain and cool temperatures, we otherwise had good weather to enjoy his garden and each other's company. The food, as usual, was delicious!

On a happy note, I just read an email from Betty Ison. She reports that the missing momma cat (found in the green shed a few weeks ago) was found again today in the garden. She and Sylvia Andino kept an eye on her until Barbie Hamby could come get her and reunite her with her kittens. A big "thank you" goes out to Betty, Sylvia, and Barbie for their kindness to the kitties. They will have a home with Barbie and her family.

Important message about preventing herbicide drift

Many crops, roadsides, and properties are being treated with herbicides this time of year. Prevent drift by following these important steps before you spray:

- Read and follow all label directions;
- Be aware of weather conditions at the time of application and for 48 hours following application, including high temperatures;
- Find out if there are any crops that are sensitive to herbicide exposure near the treatment site, and give this information to the person making the application;
- Talk to your neighbors about their crops and current growth stages;
- Tell your neighbors about your plans to spray; and
- Choose herbicides that are less likely to drift or to volatilize.

Thank you for your cooperation. We should all be good neighbors and prevent herbicide drift.

OMGA Leadership Meeting in Jackson County was on “Fire Resistant Plants for Home Landscapes” presented by Kara Baylog.

Prior to talking about fire resistant plants, Kara presented information on wildfires. She reminded us that wild fires need 3 sides of a triangle:

Weather – moisture content and wind

Topography – lay of the land. Is it flat, hilly or have ravines?

Fuel – trees, shrubs, grasses, structures, such as home, fences, decks, lawn furniture

Kara also gave statistics that 90-95% of homes that burn, do so because of flying embers. Embers can travel up to a mile ahead of an advancing wildfire.

Characteristics of Fire Resistant plants:

Leaves are moist and supple

Sap is water-like and doesn't have a strong odor

Plants have little deadwood and tend not to accumulate dry material within the plant.

A good resource when looking for plants is “Fire-Resistant Plants for Home Landscapes: Selecting Plants That May Reduce Your Risk From Wildfire”, by Amy Jo Detweiler and Stephen A. Fitzgerald: <http://catalog.extension.oregonstate.edu>., or look on-line under PNW590. The publication gives you over 110 plants in categories for groundcovers, perennials, shrubs (both broadleaf evergreen and deciduous), and trees (conifers and deciduous).

OMGA membership is 3121 (2753 + 368 trainees).

Treasurer's Report

- Patrice Sipos, OMGA Treasurer will provide treasurer training at the Sept. 6, 2019 Leadership meeting in Tangent, Oregon, from 10-12. She is encouraging all chapters to use the same accounting program (Quick Books) which would make the end of year reporting easier and would also streamline the budgeting process.

- A suggestion was made to have chapters put what businesses give MG discounts on the back of the

membership card. Chapters could check with their local business to see if they would be willing to give a discount.

Leadership Forums Report

- The group agreed that the forum was excellent on Fire-Resistant Pants. The next forum will be held Sept 6, 2019 at Tangent Oregon, from 1:00 to 4:00. The topic is climate change gardening. There may be a presentation from one of the students involved in the lawsuit on climate change.
- Nov.1, 2019 there will be a presentation on grant writing for the awards that OMGA gives out to chapters. These include the Karl Carlson, the Extension Agent Grant and the Search for Excellence. It will be held in Tillamook.

Gardener's Pen- OMGA Newsletter

This issue will focus on Firewise Gardening and will be available the end of June. Three of our members will be honored for Longevity Awards, Betty Ison for 30 years and Richard Johnston and Linda Thames for 20 years of active service to the Master Gardener program.

OMGA Grants and Awards Report

Karl Carlson awards were given to 6 counties: Curry for educational signage, Douglas for Rock Garden Signage, Lincoln for Native Hedge Row, Marion County for adaptive gardening space, Tillamook for funds to off-set expense for educational computer and Jackson for a program in plant propagation.

Five Extension Agent Grants went to Central for printing of publication, Coos for raised garden beds, Tillamook to off-set cost of laptop for educational purposes, Yamhill for a projector for educational classes and the Bee Project at OSU for identification of bees in Oregon.

Four counties have applied for Search for Excellence. Projects included plant clinic orientation from Lane, a demonstration garden for seniors/ those with disabilities from Lincoln, ABC preschool gardening for 2-5 year olds from Curry and the winner is a Jr. Master Gardening Program involving 1000 students from 6-18 years old in 10 schools in Marion.

Old Business

There was a discussion on the Memorandum of Agreement between OSU and OMGA, regarding education and the role Mini-College plays in educational opportunities.

OMGA gave \$500 to help produce 10 Webinar programs in the 2019-2020 year. Webinars cost \$250.00 to produce. There were 5 webinars produced in 2017, 11 in 2018 and 5 so far this year. The topics in 2019 include: 1.Update on Sudden Oak Death in Pacific NW. 2. Demystifying Grafted Tomatoes: The Whys and How for Gardeners. 3.Adapting Dry Farming Techniques to Vegetable Gardens. 4.Project Happy Apples: Reducing Codling Moth damage in Backyard Orchards. 5. "First Look" Reading a Pesticide Label to Protect Bees. All webinars can be watched to get 1 hour of continuing education hours. You can find all of the webinars at www.youtube.com/user/drbrake77 - they are very informative.

New Business

OMGA Chapter Survey 2019 Report - 1082 Master Gardeners (34%) responded to the survey sent out by OMGA. Results will be on the omga.org website. The survey indicated that most MG's thought Mini-College was important to extremely important to have. Discussion followed.

Points to consider regarding Mini-College:

- It has traditionally been the primary avenue for OMGA to fulfill its educational goals.
- Silent Auction provides fundraising for a number of OMGA programs and awards such as Karl Carlson, Extension Agent Grant, Search for Excellence, and providing PNW's each year to each chapter.

Questions the OMGA would like Master Gardener's to answer:

- What would it take to get you to go to Mini-college? (i.e., more tours, hands on activities, one day vs. two day)
- What do we have in the Umpqua Valley that you think MG's would like to hear about, tour, or get excited about coming to the area?
- Do you want Mini-College to continue?
- Would you be willing to join a committee to help put it on? (Name tags, speakers, registration, tours, meal planning etc.)

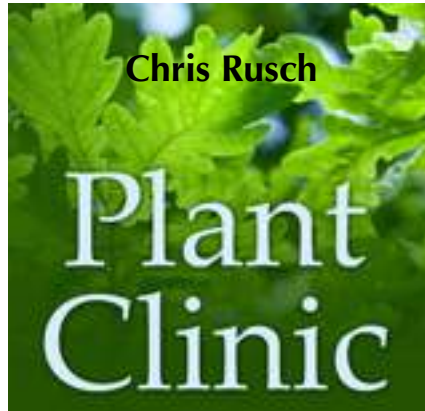

OMGA President Eric Bosler and Past President Sue Nesbitt were invited to attend the OSU Extension Home Horticulture Staff Retreat. They felt honored to be at the table and to be involved in the discussion of OSU MG vision and mission and how should be updated. A S.W.O.T. analysis came out of the meeting. S stands for Strengths (OSU research), W stands for Weaknesses (less extension agents), O stands for Opportunities (webinars- on-line learning), and T stands for Threats (funding).

Chris Rusch OMGA President Elect is looking for MG's to fill offices next year. Please contact her if you are interested in serving on the OMGA Executive Board.

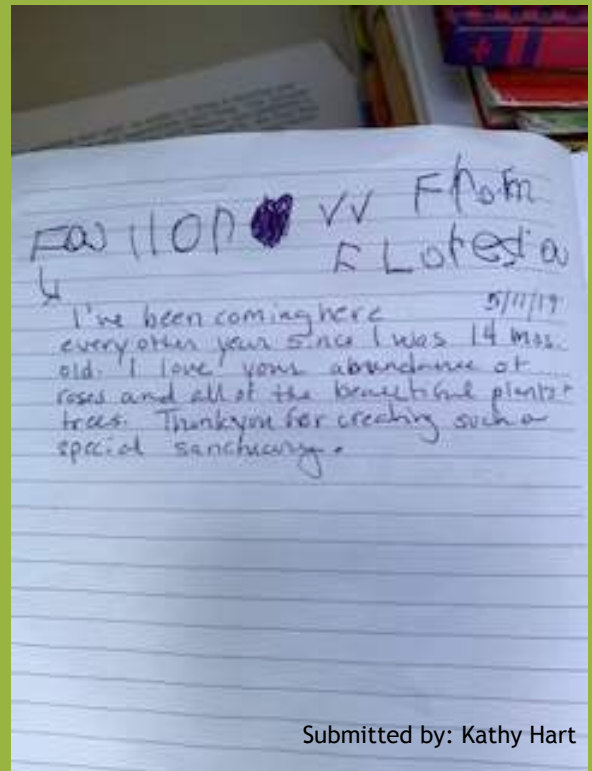

Life Memberships

Below is the Bylaws Amendment which would be voted on at the July chapter meeting.

DOUGLAS COUNTY MASTER GARDENER ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS AMENDMENT

Article II: Membership

Section 1. Membership Classes. There shall be **three** **four** classes of membership: Active, Honorary **and**, Emeritus **and** Life, as defined below.

Section 3. Life Membership. Life Membership will recognize those members who have made a substantial contribution to the Chapter. Life Members must meet the following criteria: 1) Have completed 10 years of service. 2) Have a minimum of 2500 Volunteer Hours. The Membership Director will review the records each year and determine which members are eligible to receive a Life Membership. The Chapter will pay Chapter and OMGA Dues for Life Members.

The current Section 3 will now become Section 4. The current Section 4 will now become Section 5. The current Section 5 will now become Section 6. The current Section 6 will now become Section 7.

Agent's Report - Steve Renquist
