I truly am enamored of intelligent people who can turn a clever phrase or make a witty remark. These next weeks we are hard into winter pruning at the Discovery Garden. In that vein, I offer you comments from a remarkable English gentleman, Dick Strawbridge, who, with his lovely orange/red-haired wife, Angel, purchased a 400-year-old chateau in France. This Friday (1/29) was our first of 6 pruning sessions. **Folks, we need help!!** One agent and three women (of a certain age) worked hard and fast to prune the fruit trees and clean up all of the detritus. This is usually accomplished by a dozen or more volunteers. *Please* plan to join us next week for our next adventure in pruning the ornamental garden.

Traditionally, Western Oregon gardeners prune their roses close to President's Day in February. We are scheduled to prune the roses on 2/19. I found a wonderful quip from Eleanor Roosevelt that you may appreciate, and I quote: "I had a rose named after me and I was very flattered. But I was not pleased to read the description in the catalog - 'not good in a bed, but fine against a wall'."

Speaking of catalogs, it is indeed fun to flip through the pages and dream of that glorious garden one could have, if only dreams came true! My garden dreams for the DG mostly involve my ongoing vendetta against the bittercress. We are having sporadic workdays during the next month. March will mark the return to regularly scheduled days in the DG. We have about 6-7 ardent volunteers who are coming out in small groups, multiple days of the week, to give a hand at cleaning up the winter debris, leaves and abundant weeds. More help is needed. Groundhog's Day is upon us. This Pennsylvania Dutch superstition first mentioned in 1840, has an interesting history. The


groundhog, *Marmot monax*, is a large ground squirrel that burrows into the ground for shelter from which he emerges each year on February 2nd. If he sees his shadow on a bright sunny day, he retreats back to his burrow for 6 more weeks of winter weather. No shadow forecasts an early spring. Some forecasters give him up to 47% accuracy! In the 1880's the Elks Lodge in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, held groundhog feasts serving the marinated meat that was said to taste like a cross between pork and chicken. Served with the meal was groundhog punch made of vodka, milk, eggs, orange juice and "other ingredients". The feast was not popular and was abandoned after a few years. The observance of Groundhog's Day was first published in 1886. It is pretended that the same animal has poked his head out each of the last 133 years. Punxsutawney Phil gained his monicker in 1961 (possibly in honor of Prince Philip) and to this day enjoys the status as the harbinger of spring. Let's all raise a glass of GH punch hoping good ol' Phil has a gloomy day with nary a shadow to be seen!


Membership Kay Livermore

Plant Sale

The date of the Plant Sale has changed from the usual first Saturday in May. Instead, we will be having the sale on Saturday, May 8, out at the Eastside Greenhouse. I know, all our signs say the first Saturday in May. Because customers will have to sign up for times to come to the sale, we won't be putting up signs. There are a lot of steps needed to make it happen. Here is the timeline that I am working with:

First part of February - Send sale plan to the County Parks Department to be presented to the County Commissioners for their approval since we are selling items on County property.

March - send sale plan to Steve Renquist for his review and for him to send it on to OSU for their approval.

April - We have to limit the number of people attending at one time - in the current COVID restriction environment, we are limited to 75 people at one time including workers. Should our level change to a more elevated level, we will be limited to 50 people according to the current matrix. We will be using Signup Genius to let people register for a time slot for the day of the sale. This link will be posted on our Facebook page and website. We will be allowing approximately 30 people every 20 minutes. We are also limited on parking so hopefully this will be a workable arrangement. Also in April, we will have signup on Signup Genius for the MG workers to sign up for where they would like to work during setup, the sale and cleanup.

May 6 - Thursday will be setup day. Plants will be moved from the Westside Greenhouse to the tables on the Eastside, signs posted and tables, chairs and supplies from the Extension building will be obtained. There can't be potluck for either setup day or day of the sale like we usually have.

May 7 - Friday - will be the MG ONLY sale. This will be a practice run for how we do things on Saturday when the public is there. Last year MG's got lists of plants their friends and family wanted and bought at our MG sale. I think this would be a good idea again and will help with the numbers that can come on Saturday. The hours of the sale on Friday haven't been set in stone



yet. (The whole sale hasn't been set in stone as we need approval from the County Commissioners and from OSU - so keep your fingers crossed.)

May 8 - Saturday - will be the sale for the public. Hopefully they sign up for times so we can control the flow of people and cars. There is no admission this year, no vendors and no raffle. We will try to have oneway traffic between the rows of plants, but will just have to do the best we can. Masks over mouth and nose will be required. It will definitely be a different sale than what we usually have. We have purchased several chip readers, so using credit cards will be "touchless" for the cashiers.

On another note, we are already signed up at the Fairgrounds for our sale there next year!

I will keep you posted to any changes that might come up.



FEBRUARY GARDEN CALENDAR

- Tune up your lawn mower and garden tools
- Have your soil tested
- Prune fruit trees, blueberries, and cane berries
- Spray your peach trees with lime sulfur for peach leaf curl and other fruit trees with dormant oil spray
- Prune and train grapes; make cuttings
- Prune deciduous summer-blooming shrubs and trees
- Plant fruit trees and deciduous shrubs and roses
- Plant seed flats of cole crops (cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli) in a greenhouse for later out-planting
- Control moles and gophers
- Order seeds for your vegetable garden

Ask Fred "The Tool Man" Alley

Question: My favorite small by-pass loppers are very dirty and need sharpening, but how do I get the loppers apart? I just can't get the pivot bolt or nut off. They are both really stuck.

Answer: Interestingly, I'm working on this problem as I'm writing this article. I was in Melrose last week and visited a couple who are moving and in the process of selling items from their home, including a few garden/yard tools. After purchasing a few shovels, she handed me a by-pass vine lopper. She said she had cut many blackberries with them, that she no longer needed them, plus they didn't work very well anyway. She hadn't been able to get them apart to clean and sharpen. I shared with her my volunteer work in the Master Gardener Program and that I refurbish garden/yard tools. So, she simply gave the loppers to me!



She was right. I put penetrating oil on the Pivot bolt and nut for three days. Absolutely no luck in loosening the bolt or nut using my standard socket set. In cases like this I find that I need to place the blade and the bolt and nut in a solvent.

I use a nontoxic, biodegradable, safe on skin & eyes and reusable product called "Evapo-Rust". It's a super safe rust remover. I found it at Handyman on SE Stephens, Roseburg. Use an upright container, just large enough to cover only the blades and pivot nut and bolt. I commonly use a discarded V-8 plastic container. Let it sit for a day or two. Remove and wash with warm water and soap.



It helps to use #0 steel wool for cleaning the loppers. It's amazing how clean the loppers will be. With a funnel, pour the used rust remover back into its original container for another use. Place the loppers on your workbench, with the pivot nut facing up and spray the top of the nut with penetrating oil. Let stand for at least one day.

Place the loppers in a bench vise as securely as possible. Using two 1/2 or 3/4 inch drive hex long handle socket bars, place one over the nut and one over the bolt. In this case I used a 11/16 inch Sears 12-point combination wrench. Use the box end for the tightest grip. Don't use a crescent wrench. The sockets or box end wrench will provide the best tightness on the bolt and nut. Try to remove the nut first, turning left. Some older bolts are threaded into the cutting blade side - they will turn left for removal as well. Most are standard left turn off threads. Older loppers use a standard nut and bolt with no threads in the blade side of the loppers. The newer loppers use a precision made self-aligning pivot bolt. The key to removing the bolt or nut is to set one of the bars, or in this case the 11/16 Inch combination wrench, on the work bench so it is leveraged on the bench top. I mount my bench vise on a 12x12 inch base, just to accommodate the extra leverage. The other bar should be placed for a downward motion. Sometimes, this takes a lot of muscle!



After the bolt and nut are removed, using a wire brush, clean the bolt and nut and the lopper blades as clean as you can. A bench grinder with a wire brush grinder is the best tool to use. Remember to wear your gloves, safety eye and ear protection devices. Note, the nut shows three notches where a wrench had slipped when someone was trying unsuccessfully to remove the pivot nut.





I realize many of our Master Gardeners have a variety of skills, but may not have all the items I have mentioned in this article. If you have a problem like this or similar one, please don't hesitate to call or e-mail me. I'm always willing to assist you. I know how attached we become to our garden and yard tools. (I still have favorites from my younger days.) Plus, it is equally important to restore quality tools, rather than throw them away and buy a new one of lesser quality. 541-733-6232 fhasla@msn.com



Discussion of Continuing Ed: “Understanding Seed Characteristics” from “Level Up” series.

Agent’s Report - Steve Renquist:

- Steve has been presenting Zoom lectures for Master Gardeners (3 so far) on Mondays at 10:00. Attendance has been around 30-35. These will be posted each time on our website along with the PDF’s of the lecture for those who can’t watch it live.
- Pruning sessions will begin weekly, starting this week, and will be on Fridays, 1-4. Bring masks, pruners and rain gear.
- Steve said that if you need something from the Extension office, just let him know and he can retrieve it for you.
- Steve met with the parks director along with Julie Stanbery and Laura Corder. (Julie will talk about the meeting in her report).

OFFICER REPORTS

Membership - Kay Livermore: We ended 2020 with 244 members and we have 222 currently with 6 more expected to join. Kay has membership cards and will put them in the mailbox by the Eastside Greenhouse by mid February for MG’s to pick up.

OMGA - Barbie Hamby/Kish Doyle: Not present. No report.

Treasurer - Diane Smith-Lewsadder: Financials are available on the website and are from two months ago. We have \$129.40 in the Bottle Drop fundraiser account. They should automatically send us a check when we request it. Nathan Baily should turn in any expenses he has to Diane on an expense form for reimbursement. If anyone has expense forms, mail them to Diane directly at her home address until the office opens again.

Vice-President - Diana Woodward: Diana will send out the “Level Up” continuing education link right after each monthly Board meeting and it will be included in the Newsletter each month. The next “Level Up” lecture will be February 9, at 3:00 PM, on “Multifunctional Hedgerows”.

Past President - Nancy Fuller: Nothing to report. She is enjoying taking classes online as it allows her to take them at her convenience.

President - Julie Stanbery: Julie met with Laura, Steve with Rocky Houston from the Parks Department recently. It was beneficial to walk him through what we’ve done at the garden, showing that we are good stewards of the property. Becky Carlson and John Oltman have cared for Helleck Hall. We do a lot of weeding and mowing that the Parks Department doesn’t do. Steve stressed the educational aspect of it. Laura’s going to submit an annual report to remind Rocky of what we do each year there. They also talked with him about our plans for the Plant Sale. He seemed very positive about it, but has to run it by the County Commissioners for approval first. Bonnie Durick will get the specifics to him in the next 10 days so it can run through the necessary channels.


